Sitting on a chair in her room, Mary is combing her hair when the mirror appears to speak to her through the reflection. In this one moment, she can hear all the melodies of her life (or of this oratorio respectively) like a big bang overture to the grand opera she's going to rock as soon as she will have left the room.
